Pie Run 2016

The "Last Run of 2016"

Part 1 – The Run

The first few days of November this year were exceptionally mild, plus 20° on Nov. 4th, but November 6th was wet, wet, wet. That is, it was cold and raining steadily when the hearty group gathered at the RAM parking lot for the start of the run. However, there were 16 cars in the lot with drivers and passengers not about to be deterred by a bit of dampness. After a short period of visiting and a quick driver's meeting we were on our way.

This year's run was, essentially, the completion of the 2014 Pie Run. That year we drove the portion of the Anthony Henday Drive that was open at the time. This year, with the rest of the AHD opening in October, we completed the loop. From the RAM the run was northeasterly through the city, joining the AHD at 66th Street and the proceeding east and south to Baseline Road. From there it was the usual route back into the city and to our destination at Grace United Church.

Those who came for pie in 2014 and 2016 can rightly say that they have driven completely around Edmonton on the Anthony Henday, however, a possible new event might be a "One Lap of Edmonton" run on some summer day in another year.

Part 2 – The Pies (and Surprise)

While the run was going on Rose, with help from Donna Burton, Brenda Fisher and Sandra Rosychuk, was getting the pies cut and plated, coffee and tea brewed and the Social Room in the church ready to serve everyone.

Arriving at the church people filed into the downstairs room ready to get their hands around a hot cup of coffee and see what kinds of pies we had produced this year. As always, four varieties had been baked and were laid out ready for consumption.

Being the event organizer I was about the last to arrive at the church. Dave Fisher, a former TR3 owner and a friend, was my chauffer this year and as we walked in I was pleased to see that there was a good crowd present. Along with those who had done the run a few other club members had chosen to skip the run and come directly to the church from home.

And then came the surprise.

First, I was surprised that the pies were set up in the large Social Hall rather than the smaller Sunshine Room that we have used in the past. Secondly, I noticed that there were about 20 other people in the room whom I knew well but were definitely not ECSCC members. And finally, I was really surprised when they all stood up, shouted SURPRISE! and started to sing "Happy Birthday to you".



This November I celebrated the 36th anniversary of

my 39th birthday. While attending Rolly Burton's 75th birthday celebration in June Marilyn Simpson and one or two other of the club ladies suggested to Rose that we should have a birthday party for Alec during the pie run in the fall. Nobody suggested that to me. So Rose went about secretly organizing a party.

Rose contacted several club members including Howard, Gerry, Jonathan, Brian and others and let them in on the plan. She also contacted a number of the friends that we have made through the church. Everyone was in the know but everyone was tight lipped.

So the party was on, most of the pies were consumed and a birthday cake was brought out. After doing the cutting honours the cake was shared, there was more visiting, some laughter and a memorable pie run was concluded.

And, if there was one more surprise it was that our car club members were so good at keeping a secret.





Part 3 – Pie Recipes

The Pie Run/Last Run of the Season event began in 2010 and every year after the first we have produced four different kinds of pie for the members to enjoy. Aside from apple, which is always required, the varieties have changed each year. Some turned out better than others (last year's key lime was a definite don't do again) and on the whole all were enjoyed. This year we had two new pies that were a hit with so many people that there were demands that the recipes be published in *the open road*. So here they are with slight editing for space.

Saskatoon Butter Tart Pie

(From *Flapper Pie and Blue Prairie Sky* by Karlynn Johnston. Edm. Journal Oct. 26, '16)

- Single crust for one 9 inch (22 cm) pie
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (75 ml) butter, softened
- 1 cup (250 ml) brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg
- 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp (75 ml) cornstarch
- 2 tbsp (60 ml) whipping cream
- 1 tbsp (30 ml) lemon juice
- 1 tsp (5 ml) vanilla extract
- ¹/₂ tsp (2 ml) salt

• 2 cups (250 ml) Saskatoon berries, fresh or thawed from frozen.

1. Place the oven rack in the lowest position and preheat the oven to 425 F / 218C. Lay the crust in a 9 inch pie plate, crimp the edges, and place in the refrigerator.

2. Beat the butter with brown sugar until smooth. Mix in the egg until smooth, then beat in the cornstarch. Add the whipping cream, lemon juice, vanilla and salt and beat until smooth. Gently add in the Saskatoon berries. Pour the filling into the prepared crust.

3. Bake for 15 minutes, then reduce the oven temperature to 350 F / 180 C. Bake for another 35 to 40 minutes, until the filling is

bubbling and the crust is nicely browned. Remove from the oven and let cool completely at room temperature. To ensure a firmer pie, refrigerate for an additional 2 to 3 hours.

French Lemon Pie

- (From Chatelaine.com)
- Single crust for one 9 (22 cm) pie
- 2-3 lemons
- 4 eggs
- ³/₄ cup granulated sugar
- ¹/₂ cup (125 ml) 35% cream

1. Position rack in bottom of oven. Preheat to 400 F/200 C. Bake prepared crust until pale golden – about 8 - 10 minutes. Remove crust and reset oven to 375 F/ 190 C.

2. In a large bowl whisk eggs. Gradually whisk in $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of sugar until dissolved. Whisk in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fresh lemon juice and 2 tsp lemon zest, then $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cream. Pour into warm pie shell.

3. Bake 25 - 30 minutes until centre is set when jiggled. Serve with whipped cream if desired.

Note: Gluten-free crusts may be used for both pies.

Frank's Filler

Wheel Repair?



Last month I started to work on the MGB steering wheel I got from a club member quite a few years ago. It was badly cracked on one side where the rim met the banjo wires. We used one of those vibrating multi tools on the worst side to remove the plastic part that had cracked and raised up. Through sanding of the rusty rim and a shot of rust preventative to hopefully prevent further problems. Then we mixed up a batch of JB Weld's Plastic Epoxy Putty and pressed a generous amount into place. Then we let it cure overnight.

It had shrunk a fair amount the next morning so we applied a thinner amount to build up some areas that had needed a bit more and let that dry the length of time required by the instructions. For the other repairs done later, we put in a smaller amount at first and built it up afterwards.

Using the handy contour sanding grips that I got at Lee Valley Tools and 80 grit sandpaper, we got things into shape quickly. The grips are very handy for small jobs and as one shouldn't use finger tips for sanding, they do a good job of



spreading the load. We moved up to 120 paper to do some finer stuff and then left things for a few days. It was looking pretty good...

We then used a Dremel tool with cutting disc to open up the other cracks and undercut the edges to give the putty a bit more tooth to grab on. The other side of the wheel wasn't bad but had two distinct cracks; one top and one bottom. There was also a crack in the rim that went around the wheel and a quite a few hairline cracks on the rim itself. Filled with putty and left for a few days to cure. We were heading to the finish.. not the end.. but, what kind of finish.



The front side needed the most work while the back side, though shallow, needed a fair amount as well.



Found the epoxy putty was a little soft so I coated it with an epoxy called Liquid Wood. This is designed to soak in to weakened or punky wood and I ran some tests on leftover hardened putty. It did seem to soak into the epoxy putty so we used some micro brushes to apply it over the putty and let it set. Very liquid, so we had a bit more sanding to do with 200 grit where the liquid dripped.

With everything shaped, we moved to 400 grit wet and dry paper. Most people say soak the wet and dry for about 15 minutes before use. Makes the paper more flexible. Tackled the wheel with the rubber grip; things got nice and smooth pretty quickly; we noticed some hairline cracks but left them to see what would happen after priming.

Set up a screen of paintable plastic masking. (great stuff but only seen it in big rolls at body supply places). Paint will stick to the treated surface.

Clamped a shaft into the vice, masked the spokes with painters tape and mounted the wheel. We



primed the wheel with a rattle can of Krylon Primer. Lots of light coats and being able to spin the wheel helped with the coverage. The surface looked horrible, micro fissures all over, a few bigger cracks, so we left it for five days. Checked it today and it looks better than I thought. Going to need some spot putty I think, or a real thin application of the liquid epoxy wiped on with a cloth. Leaning towards the liquid epoxy.



We went with spot putty; it did a good job of filling things in but was a bit of a chore to sand off, first with 150 grit, then 220 and finally 400.

Haven't quite got the wheel finished; the primer went on okay but there's still some work to be done before final finishing so we'll have to save that for the new year.

Better pause and wish every one the best of the season and a very Happy New Year. Sorry I missed everyone at the Christmas Party but I was down with a plague.

Hope you're looking forward to the January 18th meeting, where people leap forward to volunteer for a club Executive Position. It's not that hard; I've done most of them over the years, a few of them more than once. But new blood in a position is good, so think about it.

February is planning night and wouldn't it be neat to have three or four "never before seen" events? They could be simple or complex, local or long distance. Involve food or not.. well okay, I take that one back.. usually involves food. Couple of important meetings coming; sorry I'm going to miss January's.. off to visit my Brother back East on that day. One would think I planned it that way... naw...

In such cases where space is not available for an entry already accepted to the show, the Producer will have sole authority to deny entrance to the building to vehicles arriving after the building capacity has been reached. Exhibitors denied access to the building will be refunded any monies paid to the Producer, upon request.
- 4. The Producer shall have final authority to determine the locations of an Exhibitor's display within the show and the Exhibitor's compliance with the aforesaid rules, regulations and policies.
- 5. Once the Exhibitor's display and/or vehicle are set up in the show, they shall not be removed or concealed by the Exhibitor prior to the end of the show without the permission of the Producer.
- 6. Neither the Producer, show chairman, sponsor, nor any other officer, director or shareholder thereof, or the owner of the building at which the show is produced, shall be responsible or liable for any personal injury to the Exhibitor or any person affiliated with the Exhibitor, including but not limited to any person or minor under the direction and/or control of the Exhibitor, and the Exhibitor, on behalf of itself and any such person producer any such plane for the person or minor under the direction. person and/or minor, as the case may be, hereby waives any such claim for personal injury. Additionally, the Exhibitor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Producer against any claim for personal injury by itself or any person and/or minor under the direction and/or control of the Exhibitor. 


